IMPORTANT NOTES FOR STRICT COMPLIANCE

To ensure a successful academic session at the Nigerian Law School, aspirants must adhere to the following rules and regulations:

- 1. ATTENDANCE:** Attendance at lectures is compulsory and is a fundamental requirement at the Nigerian Law School. Each aspirant is required to attain a minimum of 70% attendance in all lectures before being eligible to sit for the Bar Final Examinations. Failure to meet this requirement will result in disqualification from writing the Bar Final examinations/termination of admission. Rule 7 (1) code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.
- 2. MODE OF DRESSING:** Aspirants must maintain a high standard of modesty and professionalism in their dressing. The following dress Code/Regulation is prescribed for (female) students for lectures: Black or navy-blue skirt suit with white camisole or white shirt, Black or navy-blue dress with long or three-quarter sleeves, the prescribed length of skirt and dresses is below the knee, black skull caps or black shoulder length hijabs, earrings must be moderate, Dark coloured hair attachment/wig not longer than shoulder length and Short nude coloured nails Plain black leather shoes with moderate heels.

For (male): Black or navy-blue trousers and suit with white shirt, black or law school tie, black socks and black plain leather shoes. Casual dressing, flamboyant outfits, and non-professional attire are strictly prohibited. Non-compliance will lead to disciplinary action, including denial of entry into lectures, and could ultimately affect participation in key academic activities. Rule 5 (1) Code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.
- 3. PARTICIPATION IN EXTERNSHIP:** Participation in the Court and law firm Office Externship is a mandatory requirement of the Bar Part II students. During these Programme, students are expected to gain practical legal experience and document their activities in a portfolio. Upon returning from the externship, all students must defend their portfolio before a panel. Failure to complete the programme successfully or defend the portfolio assessment will lead to withholding of examination results. Rule 9 code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.
- 4. LAW DINNER:** The three compulsory Body of Benchers Law Dinners are a fundamental aspect of the legal training process. Attendance at these dinners is mandatory, as they serve as part of the ethical and professional training of aspirants. Absence at any of the law dinners will lead to examination results being withheld, until the three compulsory dinners are kept. Rule 5 (2) Code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.
- 5. EXAMINATION MISCONDUCT:** Any form of misconduct in the examinations such as possession of any written materials, possession of examination answer sheets (used or unused) outside of examination venue, communication involving passing of notes or other accessories to aid performance in an examination hall, Acquisition or possession of typed question paper, stealing of another student's answer scripts to submit it as own scripts, mutilation of another student's answers script, Impersonation to write an examination, Threat to invigilators, supervisors or officers in charge of examination, Smuggling of dangerous weapons such as daggers, knives, guns, spears, axes, blades, into examination venue/examination premises or possession of such items during examination and Writing notes on body or clothes, or table. Will lead to Immediate expulsion and Disqualification for Ten (10) years from the Nigerian Law School. Rule 7 and 8 code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.

6. SOME OTHER GENERAL MISCONDUCTS THAT STUDENTS SHOULD AVOID:

- Conduct adjudged as not being fit and proper by the Disciplinary Committee.
- Being rude to, molesting, intimidating or harassing any Law School Staff or student.
- Betting and gambling in the school premises.
- Involvement in case of theft, extortion, fraud, misappropriation, threat, coercion, or blackmailing other people.
- Smoking cannabis, using narcotics, or possession of illicit drugs.
- Drunkenness and cigarette smoking in library, class and café, hostel and other areas designated for learning.
- Sexual assault, rape and abuse, misbehaving against good morality, sexual harassment or any sexually-related wrong act.
- Possession of a gun, acid, or dangerous substance which may constitute a threat to life or capable of harming other people's life and property.
- Participating in disorderly religious worship outside designated areas for religious-worship.
- Betting and gambling in the school premises.
- Non-participation in small or large group sessions for all courses.
- Signing attendance register for another student under any circumstance.
- Walking on or across the lawns, disturbing ornamental plants, littering the environment, urinating in open or non- designated places, defecating in nylon bags and disposing same around the premises, spitting, nose-blowing or other unsanitary behavior.
- Inducing staff for any service and failure to report any demand from staff.
- Taking alcohol, soft drinks, snacks or food during lectures.
- Engaging in any private study organized by staff for fee or other advantages and failure to report any request to do so to the authorities of the Nigerian Law School.
- Selling accommodation to another student.
- Unauthorized use of electrical appliances or heating elements, or tampering with or altering electrical installations on the school premises.
- Damaging or destroying school property Stealing properties of the Nigerian Law School.
- Engaging in any form of demonstration.
- Failure to comply with and observe dinner etiquette and manners
- Failure to comply with public health protocols.

The sanctions for the listed misconducts range from a warning or strong warning for first-time offenders to rustication, termination of admission, or expulsion for serious offenses such as rape, sexual assault, or other grave misconduct. Rule 6 code of conduct for students of Nigerian Law School.

1. **CHANGE OF NAME:** The Nigerian Law School does not permit a change of names during the programme. Students are bound by the name forwarded by their respective universities.
2. **RESRIPTING OF QUALIFYING CERTIFICATE:** Scripting errors in the qualifying certificate must be reported within three (3) months of the date of call to the Bar. Candidates will be surcharged for scripting if the errors result from their omissions.
